


What do we aspire to as a school? To be a happy school where children achieve!

## Learning


It's cool to learn at St. Paul's!

We make sure that lessons are fun and active, but also challenge our students to think. We know it's important to make sure that students experience a wide and balanced curriculum to allow them to make informed choices about what they would like to do later on. Teachers work hard to ensure that every student makes excellent progress regardless of their starting point. This means that students of all abilities are challenged to learn and improve.









### We are a Catholic School

This means that we take the spiritual development of our students very seriously. We understand that they will need a 'moral compass' when they move on from education and teaching young people to live a life based on gospel values is fundamental to what we do.

All our students take part in day retreats in Key Stage 3, with residential retreats being regularly oversubscribed with our older students. Masses and liturgies play an important part in school life, as they bring us together as a community to celebrate the Eucharist and reflect on different aspects of the liturgical year.

Students regularly raise thousands of pounds for charitable causes every Advent and Lent.



# Beyond the Classroom

Education is not just restricted to a classroom! At St. Paul's we recognise that young people need a breadth of experience in order to develop their talents. Year 7 start with a 'Fresher's Week', where they can sign up for a range of activities which run during lunchtime and after school. In all year groups there are opportunities to take part in sports, drama, music, as well as lots of other clubs. We also run a large number of trips and excursions including: Geography Field Trips, Spanish and French Residentials and Exchanges, Year Group Success Trips to places like the Chessington World of Adventures and Brighton, all this alongside our annual Ski Trip.


